Wolf

Wolves can be found in many countries in the northern hemisphere. They live in groups called packs which contain between six-20 members. They are carnivores and hunt together to take down large prey like moose or elk. Wolves have a hierarchy within their packs and all wolves within the pack help to raise the pups.

Wolf pups

Typically, wolves give birth to four to six pups in one litter. At four weeks old they begin to eat regurgitated food. At two months old, the wolf pups leave the den and are looked after by adult wolves of the pack in a safe place. When they are about eight months old, they are large enough to join with the adults in hunting.





Did you know?

Touch is important to wolves from birth. When born, wolves are deaf and blind and have to use their senses of touch and smell. As they grow, wolves learn friendly and aggressive touches. Young wolves may play-fight as a way of judging the strength of family members.
