| Norman | The name given to things made by the Normans, people from Normandy in France who came to Britain in 1066. |

| Reconstruction(s) | To construct a past event by piecing together evidence or to construct an object not using the original materials |
| Replica | An exact copy of an object or painting |
| Roman | The name given to things made by the Romans, people from Italy who came to Britain in AD 43 |
| Saxon | The name given to things made by the Saxons, people from North Germany who came to Britain in the 5 th century AD. |
| Viking | The name given to things made by the Vikings, people from Scandinavia who came to Britain in the 9 th century AD. |
